





explosions I tried in Riverside but they never worked. During this time, I realised that all of us were being incredibly unsafe in school and were incredibly lucky to be allowed to do the experiments that we did. I'm insanely grateful to everyone at Riverside that let us run with our curiosity because that became an incredible way for us to learn.

The army officers in class often just assumed that the civilians were nerds and they didn't hang out with the rest of us because of an existing bias against the MSc students. But then, over time that changed because of constant conversation regarding the different ways that people learn and how much importance we gave to our study. In order to bridge that knowledge gap, I led multiple study groups where the MSc students taught the officers about the science of weapons and the officers taught us about how the weapons function. But most importantly, the one trend I noticed since the start of this course has been that the design of weapons and weapon systems all over the world has little consideration of the end users. The clients (Senior officers) provide companies with a budget based requirement instead of what the soldiers (end users) truly want. In essence, this creates a gap where the basics of user-centric design could save the


world an insane amount of money simply by shifting focus to the user instead of the money.

But even generally, I felt like this point after one semester and a month is good enough for me to actually judge how far I've come and how this place has changed me from what I was in school. People often ask me what kind of a cultural shock I received since I've come all the way to Sonipat, and it's so different from Gujarat. To this question, they expect me to answer regarding alcohol and smoking, and that I am not used to this idea, or it tempts me since I have the freedom and choice to do what I want. I see other friends of mine who have started smoking and drinking to fit into groups here and make friends, and there was a time when I thought that making friends wasn't possible if one didn't smoke or drink. I've also been put down and neglected because of this many time and people refuse to include me because I'm not 'cool' enough and because I say no. But I genuinely feel that there is no 'shock' here. All these things don't tempt me, no matter how many time people leave me out.

All the presentations, MUNs, inter-school competitions, and other opportunities have made me so independent, that I can believe that I am capable of presenting myself in front of people and getting my way through it.

More than any of that, I regretted leaving out certain people in school on meet-ups and parties. I realized this after I had been left out by many people, and a point came such that even my roommates started to neglect me. I genuinely don't wish that upon anyone else, ever. It's a nightmare, and I can't stress that enough.

But all in all, I am happy now, and doing well. I'm really enjoying the subjects here because they offer a whole new perspective on everyday concepts. Even subjects such as history, which are deemed as boring by popular-belief are really intriguing because they're not just based on facts but on elements such as how that shaped and changed the society, and how those issues lead to the contemporary world. The only thing I feel is that we should be taught history in school because it really sets the base for entrances as well as college. Here they assume we know the facts and that's why they delve in deeper. So I have a lot of extra work to do because I'm not aware of the facts.

Missing Riverside and you, and can't wait to come back to school very soon! See you, and thank you for your everlasting impact that's practically helping me survive in college. It really is a harsh world out here but your lessons and opportunities make it worthwhile.
